The assistance will be in the form of bonding fee cost reimbursement and applies to either a subcontractor or prime contractor at any tier in the construction project. USDOT will reimburse DBEs the premiums paid to the surety company for performance, payment or bid/proposal bonds. The premium fee

Additional \$172 million allocated for rural water projects Water and environmental projects in 24 states will soon get off the ground following the allocation of another \$172 million in Recovery Act funding announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). To date, USDA has announced \$1.64 billion in loans and grants for similar projects. Among the most recent projects are a \$3.3 million loan through USDA Rural Development to Louisa, Virginia,

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security will administer the funds, which will be used to replace five

Since June, more than \$354 million in Recovery Act funding has been spent for explosive detection systems in airports in California, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Arkansas, Colorado, Florida, Hawaii, Missouri, Montana, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Texas and Virginia. The Ohio funding is part of more than \$240 million announced for 10 airports for inline baggage handling systems.

Four **Minnesota** counties are seeking Recovery Act funds as part of a grant to store water in the Mustinka River system. The project would also change the road elevations on the 25 road crossings over the river. The costs are expected to be between \$18 million and \$25 million and will be competing with other grant requests from across the country.

The new plant is expected to use less energy than similar sized plants. Construction is expected to be completed by December 2011.

USDOT unveils program to assist with bonds Aimed at helping small, disadvantaged businesses compete for contracts Small and disadvantaged businesses will be ensured the best opportunity to participate in U.S. Department of Transportation (USDOT) projects funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) thanks to the newly created Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Bonding Assistance Program. The program will allow small and disadvantaged businesses to apply to be reimbursed for bonding premiums and fees incurred

What the states are doing More than 20 projects of the **Missouri** National Guard are being funded by some \$3 million in Recovery Act

city's airport runways will be upgraded with \$10.5 million in stimulus funds as well. Another \$13.4 million will be available to create a citywide wireless Internet system.

Facilities upgrades in the Palo Alto, California, school district will benefit from up to \$25 million in Qualified School Construction Bond tax credits, which allows federal income tax credits to lenders who purchase bonds from school districts. That generally covers the amount of interest the district would have owed a lender. The district is currently undergoing an overhaul of facilities at the elementary, middle and high school levels. The

The National Mall in **Washington**, **D.C.**, will get a facelift thanks to Recovery Act funding. Within the next year, a major renovation of the Lincoln Memorial grounds and reflecting pool should begin as well as repairs to a seawall in front of the Jefferson Memorial. The two projects have a combined price tag of nearly \$50 million. At the Lincoln Memorial, new walkways, lighting and security barriers will be built and at the Jefferson Memorial, the long reflecting pool will be refurbished.

Highway 89 at Lake Tahoe, California, will see its rehabilitation budget increase approximately \$25 million from the Recovery Act. The highway project calls for widening of the roadway's shoulders and erosion control

Taos, Las Cruces and the Santa Fe, Grant, Dona Ana and Sandoval counties in **New Mexico** will share \$1.3 million in energy efficiency grants as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act. The funds can be used for energy audits, building retrofits, building code changes, inspections and financial incentives for energy efficiency improvements. Building a new "green" storm water system just got \$1.3 million easier for the residents of Ohiopyle, Pennsylvania. That's how much Recovery Funding is headed toward the town of only 74. The funds will not

that makes it more efficient and reduces energy consumption. Additionally, a Story City, Iowa wind energy company has been named the recipient of a \$1.8 million guaranteed loan and a \$500,000 grant to build a wind turbine for energy generation. The turbine is expected to produce nearly 3.3 million kilowatts of electricity each year and generate more than \$200,000 in electricity to be sold to the local utility company.

Although not part of the Recovery Act, these funds can be used for renewable energy systems, energy efficiency improvements, feasibility studies and energy audits. For instance, a Charleston, Illinois, firm was granted \$20,000 to replace a grain dryer that is a quarter of a century old. The new dryer will use technology

A new online baggage handling system for the Dayton (Ohio) International Airport will be paid for with \$10 million in Recovery Act funds. The system will feature enhanced explosive detection technology that will help speed up the passenger check-in process and enhance airport security.

screening machines. The inline explosive detection systems mean passengers will no longer have to carry their checked baggage to a screening location and wait before going on to the security checkpoint.

Some of the projects include renovations at the Kingshighway Readiness Center in St. Louis, at an aviation facility in Springfield and at the Guard's training facilities near Jefferson City and Fort Leonard Wood. Three **New York** counties will share \$15.4 million in Recovery Act funding for projects that will improve drinking water in their areas. The Chaffee Water Works Co. in Erie County will receive \$800,000 for improvements to the existing well source, addition of a new backup source, replacement of an existing storage tank, upgrades to the hydro-pneumatic system, automated treatment controls, tank level alarms and more. Caneadea in Allegany

district must enter into contracts using 10 percent of the bond proceeds within six months. New library facilities and rehabilitating homes for the elderly are a couple of the possibilities being explored in 12 counties in **Kansas**, which are expecting to benefit from \$500,000 in stimulus funds that has been awarded to the Southeast Kansas Community Action Program. County officials also are exploring whether the funds can be used for improvements to sidewalks and buildings to make them comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Project proposals will be studied by a committee and awards made from the funding.

A general contractor is likely to be sought by next spring for the \$3.8 million multifamily project on the Puyallup Tribe reservation in Tacoma, Washington, funded by \$3 million in Recovery Act money. The project will

Other national news \$13 million headed to renewable energy projects in 38 states Loans and grants totaling \$13 million will fund 233 renewable energy projects in 38 states, thanks to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Energy for America Program (REAP).
